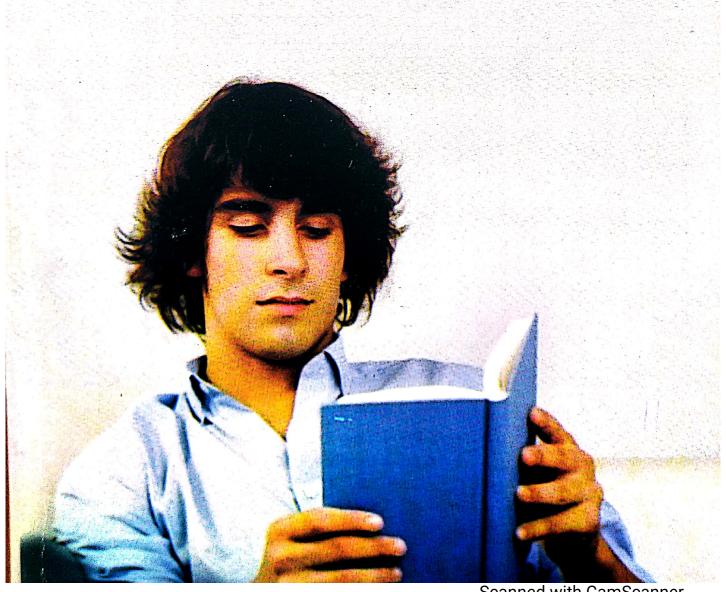
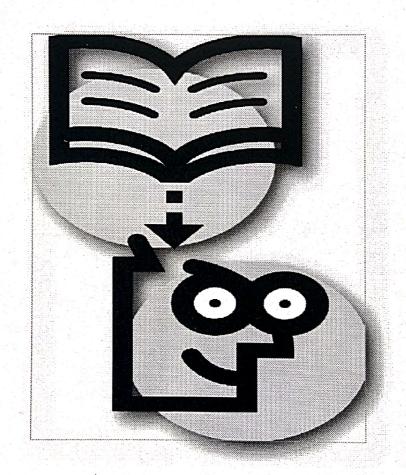

INTRODUCTION

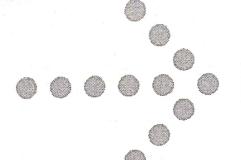
Reading—suggested by Anthony, Pearson, & Raphael (Farrell (2002:1) is the process of constructing meaning through the interaction among the reader's knowledge, the information by the written language, and the context. It involves the reader, the writer, and the text. There are some problems less skilled readers have while reading; one of them is that they cannot comprehend the text, or they do not understand what they are reading. These readers should take a strategic approach to reading; and among those strategies there are *Skimming* and *Scanning* which will be discussed in this book.

The first discussion in this book is about identifying *Topics*, because English language is topic-centred (Farrell, 2002:35); so it is very important for the readers to know. In the second chapter identifying the *Main Ideas* is discussed, because most comprehension exercises ask for readers to locate them. The last chapters talk about *Skimming* and *Scanning* which are basic skills the readers need to help them understand the texts. Each discussion is followed by the exercises to give the students and the readers practise in this type of strategy.

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Chapter One

IDENTIFYING TOPICS

Reading is a complex process, especially when you are reading something that is written in a foreign language. There are two steps to be a successful reader. Firstly, is identifying the topic of the passage. Secondly, is identifying the main idea.

Topic is the subject of a movie or a conversation. The subject of most writing is also called a topic. The topic answers the question "what or who is about?" It is usually just a word or a short phrase.
